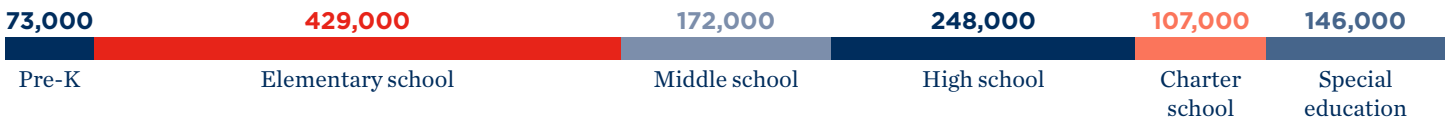

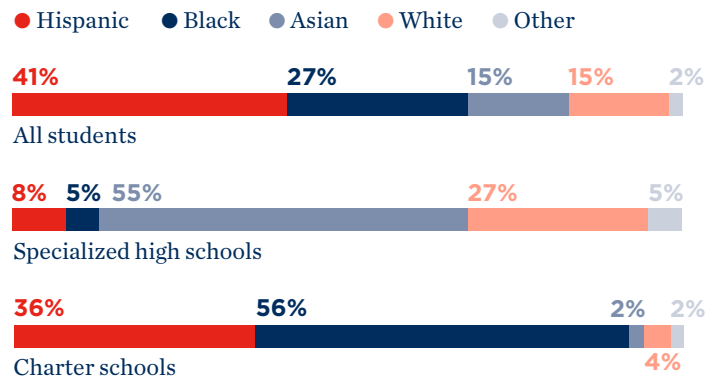

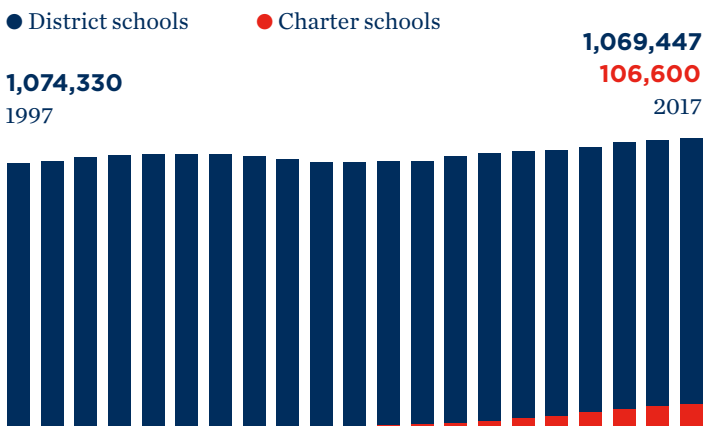

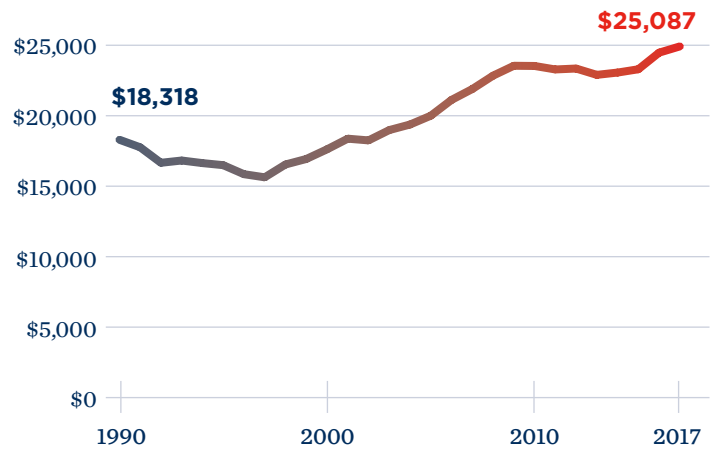
Student ethnicities



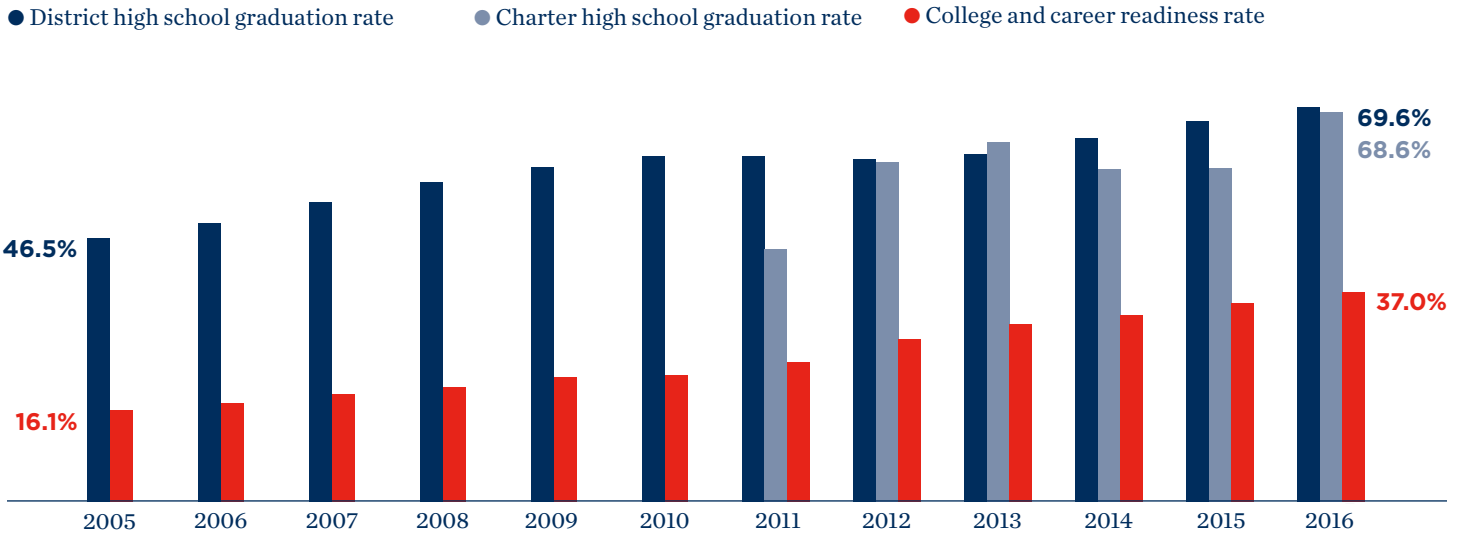
School enrollment



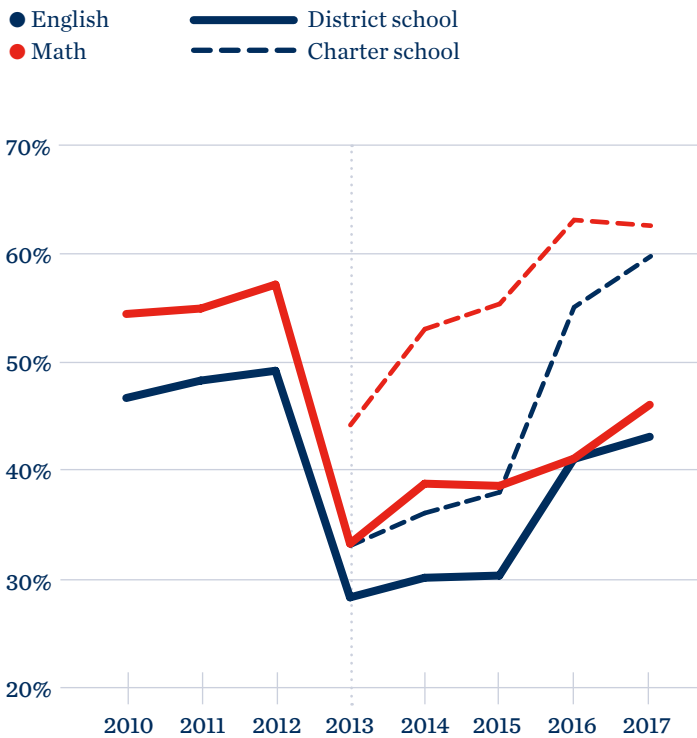
Spending per student



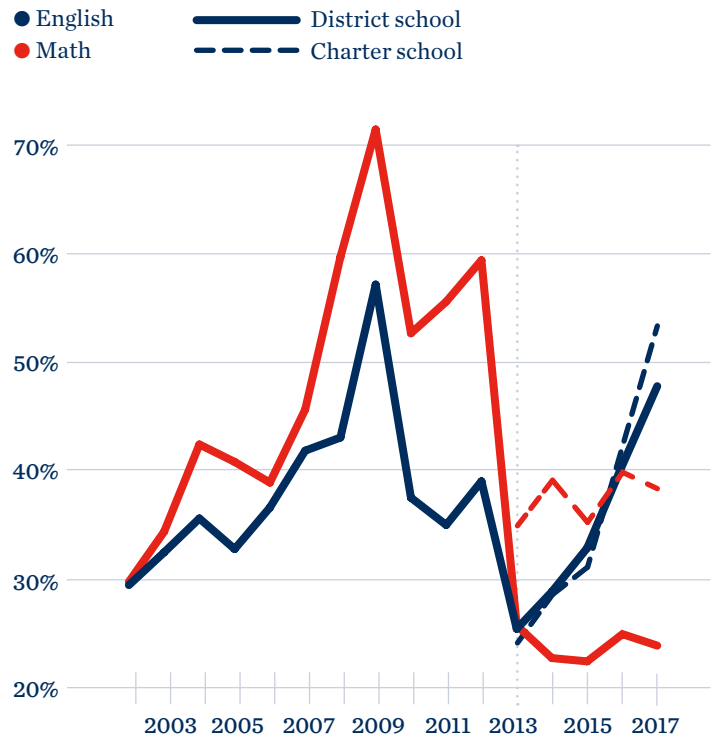
New York City high school graduation, and college and career readiness rates



Third grade English and math proficiency



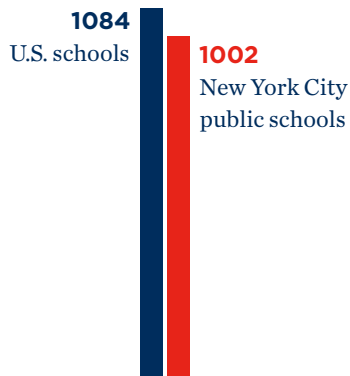
Eighth grade English and math proficiency



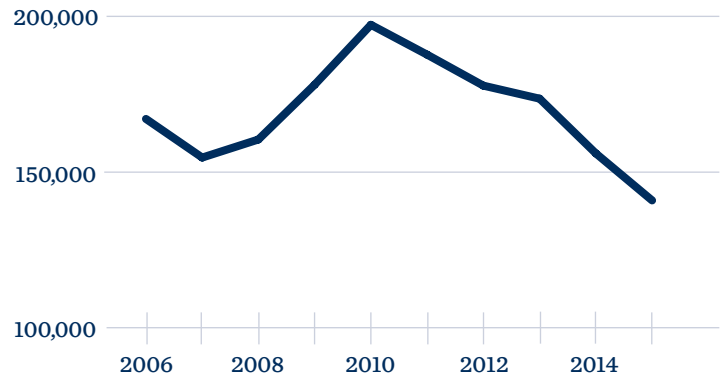
New York state adopted the more challenging Common Core standards in 2010, with additional revisions in 2013. Time limits for tests were removed in 2016.

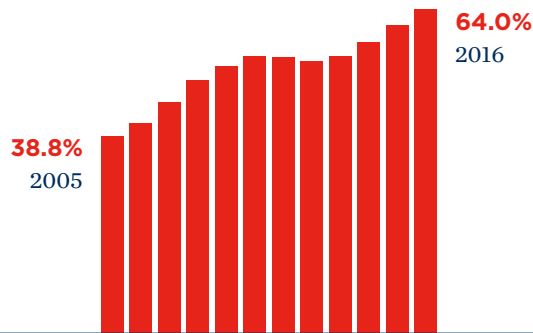
Average SAT score, 2016



Disconnected youth (aged 18–24 neither working nor in school)

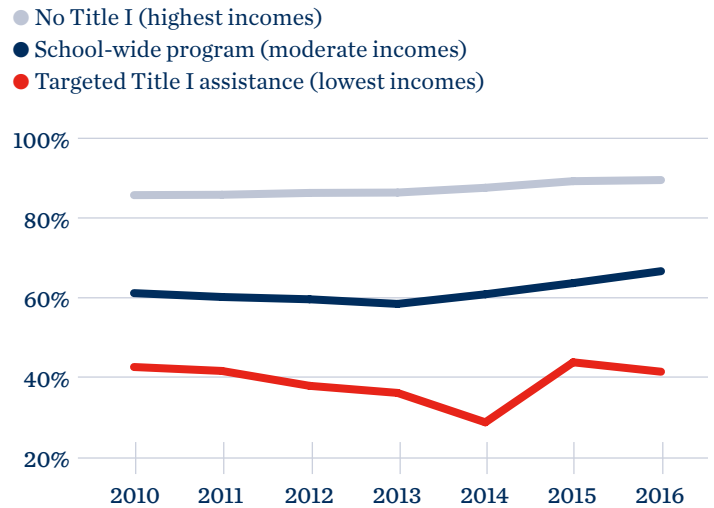


New York City public high school graduation rate for black and Hispanic students

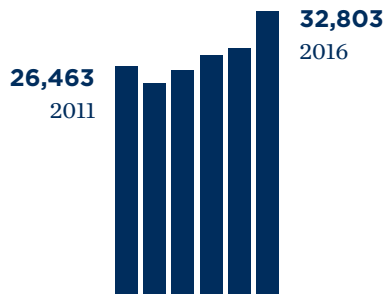
