





New York state adopted the more challenging Common Core standards in 2010, with additional revisions in 2013. Time limits for tests were removed in 2016.




Average SAT score, 2017




New York City public high school graduation rate for black and Hispanic students



Homeless student population




Disconnected youth (aged 18–24 neither working nor in school)
